THE RESEARCH PROCESS

Left column, from top to bottom: The SRCS Ranger Team recently carried out our first school field trip at Katoonarib Village, with Rangers and Cadets from Katoonarib and Sawariwau taking eleven children and three adults out on a bird-watching trip around the village. (1) Thinking Together for Those Coming Behind Us: Ranger Samuel Cyril leading a column of children practicing using their binoculars. (2) Cadet Ranger Kim Spencer explaining the proper use and care of binoculars before setting out. (3) Kim handing out binoculars and bird book to Darwin Peters and the other children, after explaining how to use the book to identify different bird species.

Right column, from top to bottom: After the introduction to birds and equipment use, it was time to go out and do some bird watching! (1) The team split up into two teams and then proceeded to take a walk around Katoonarib Village, keeping eyes and binoculars out for any signs of birds. (2) Ranger Samuel Cyril pointing what could only be a bird in the distance out to Councillor Grace Cyril, as the rest of the group looks carefully. (3) By the end of the day, the children were more than able to use the equipment to better investigate all the different birds around them. A total of 36 different species of birds were recorded on the field trip.

BIRDS OF THE RUPUNUNI

This section features photos and a short description of bird species found in the Rupununi taken by SRCS members during routine field activities, while guiding for bird-watching expeditions, and all sorts of other opportunities. This Newsletter includes the Black-bellied Whistling Duck, the Southern Crested Caracara, and the Greater Yellowlegs.

From left to right: (1) The Black-Bellied Whistling Duck (Anarao) is one of the two whistling duck species in the Rupununi. It has generally benefitted from forest clearing for pasture, which tends to create small ponds and other suitable habitats for ducks. It is a migratory bird that is generally seen in flocks and breeding in the Rupununi during the rainy season, before heading further south into Brazil for the rest of the year. (2) The Southern Crested Caracara (Karakarai) is a bird commonly seen in the savannahs, whose English and Wapishana names both reflect its bird song. It is a very unmistakable bird with a bright red face, black crest and body, and white neck and breast, with some white on its tail feathers. The Southern Crested Caracara is an opportunistic bird, feeding on carrion, roadkill, and is often seen hunting small animals running away from savannah fire. (3) The Greater Yellowlegs is a migratory bird that is usually seen during the northern winter season, but can also be seen year-round in the Rupununi. It is a wader that feeds primarily on small fish, often swimming or dashing after them in shallow water.



Note: The endangered Red Siskin (Sporagra cucullata) is officially protected by the South Rupununi Conservation Society.

The SRCS is currently researching its ranges in the South Rupununi, to be included as a proposed Important Birding Area (IBA).
